As the students progress to and through their middle and senior years with us there are changes that you may well see. School and home partnership is especially important as we support the children through this developmental stage in their lives.

For instance your children may show bursts of emotion, they may become judgmental and critical about themselves and others. They also develop a greater sense of self confidence and will often take on tasks and responsibilities that they know they will have success in. In this age group (7-11 year olds) children are often sensitive to criticism and respond particularly well to positive responses. The road ahead may seem a little rocky at times. However we are all here to help our intrepid adventurers and we look forward to sharing that support role with you. So many changes. . . .How exciting.
