Hi everyone,

Hello, from a very busy TAPS. We have launched into our term 4 jobs, in preparation for next year. TA Intermediate has completed most of their transition to Year 7 actions and our Year 6's are soon to finish their final year here. I confess to feeling both excited and a little sad as we contemplate our Topa students taking flight into the next phase of their lives.

As we've been out and about in the school, we have taken time to appreciate how amazing our tamariki are. They run, play, share, try new things, take risks, support each other, encourage and celebrate wins more often than not. It's important to remember this when things are busy and the Christmas season approaches. Let's focus on the good we see in our little people.

Thank you to all people who have contributed financially to school life and events throughout 2020. We have been a part of the governments 'School Donation Scheme' meaning we have been paid \$150 per child enrolled on the 1st of July. This money has been used to cover the costs of trips, shows, visitors, and most of the Year 6 camp to Totara Springs. However, money donated by parents towards the cost of camp in particular, enables our school to offer similar opportunities to the next cohort.

Also, I would like to acknowledge all those in our community who have volunteered time this year. For example the Friends of TAPS volunteer group who raise money to improve the playgrounds, parents and caregivers who have generously refereed or managed sports teams, or helped at sporting events or attended school trips. We sincerely appreciate your efforts and thank you for giving your valuable time to support our students.

Another thanks to those in our community who have nominated TAPS when applying for, or renewing, their mortgage with ANZ. As a result of this, ANZ Schools Programme awards 800 credits to us, each time our school is nominated. We have used these points to purchase gazebos and chilly-bins for our Friends of TAPS, to buy Apple TV's so our computers can project onto our classroom TVs without cords, to buy robotics equipment and iPads for use in our Junior Classrooms and a few other little treats like sports equipment too.

Now for some new legislation...from 11 November 2020, the existing prohibition on smoking at schools is extended to include vaping. We must take all reasonably practicable steps to ensure that no person vapes in any part of our school, whether inside or outside, at any time of day.

Buses - The College has reminded us that the **last day for buses in Term 4 is on Thursday 10th December**. TAPS doesn't finish until Tuesday 15th at 12.45pm, meaning parents of bus students will need to arrange alternative transportation for their children on Friday 11th, Monday 14th and Tuesday 15th of December (at the earlier time of 12.45pm).

In 2021 bus tags will cost \$50 per term, per child. Despite the increase, this is extremely cheap as it equates to \$5 per week, \$1 a day, 0.50c a trip! We appreciate the hard work carried out by the Te Awamutu Schools Bus Committee, offering a massive amount of transportation to Year 0- Year 13 students all over Waipa - especially Noel Cox from TA College who manages the whole show. We also acknowledge the tough job that the bus drivers have - not all children behave as they should on buses (except our TAPS children of course), and they constantly do their best to get our children delivered home to us safely.

Parking. We know it is an issue and it causes frustration to many of us, especially on wet days. Please do not park over the driveways of our neighbours. Also, do not stop in the bus stop during the times listed on the road sign. If staff see you parked in the wrong area, we may ask you politely to move on and we don't expect to be verbally abused for it. Legally, the road is not a part of our jurisdiction and therefore breaking of the road rules needs to be reported to the Police. Our priority is to manage the area so that our children are safe when attending or leaving school. It is expected that our students ALL use the crossing when coming to, or leaving, school. Our older students may be capable of crossing the road, but they are role modelling to our younger students who may not be. Parents need to be a role model to everyone.

Staff do park on Teasdale Street as we have too few internal car parking spaces for the number of staff we have. Also staff from the rest home also park on the side of the road. This cannot be helped, it's a public road. We have spoken to both the Council and the Ministry of Education and there is little they can or will do to help us resolve this issue.

All I can do is offer solutions;

- Consider letting children walk or ride to school,
- Use the back gate and a walkway on Douglas Ave that leads to our field, there is a lot of space there,
 - Carpool with a friend or neighbour,
 - Drop your child off further down Teasdale and make them walk. Use a raincoat if required.
 - Book in to our brilliant After School Care programme for an hour the small cost is well worth it for less stress.
 - Remember, our new entrants leave at 2.50pm and the rest of the school at 3pm. Part of this decision was about rolling over the carparks


