First and foremost I would like to begin my newsletter piece with our warmest congratulations to Candy and Glen MacWilliam. There is nothing like a colleague expecting a baby to make everyone on staff happy and joyous.

A few quick reminders; there is a teacher only day on Friday (this Friday!) Please ensure you have care arranged for your child or children. Staff will be at Te Awamutu College participating in professional development alongside many of the other schools in our

area.

Most of our teaching staff will be attending a Paid Union Meeting (PUM) on Tuesday 22nd June 2021. Legally, all members must be allowed to attend. To prevent disruption to families we have organised our school so that half of our members (12) will attend the morning session and the other half will attend the afternoon session and school will be open as usual for all students. This may make for an unsettled day but we will endeavour to keep the learning programme ticking over as best as we can for the short period the classroom teacher is offsite.

Last week, 7th - 11th June 2021, marked Support Staff Week around the country. I would like to use this forum to express just how grateful we are for our wonderful support staff whether they be in the admin team, cleaners, Manu or our precious teacher aides. While they all perform separate duties they are a vital part of the collective success of our school.

Also last week, teachers completed a series of learning observations on each other. It can be a bit nerve-wracking for some but ultimately it is an opportunity to learn from each other and develop our practice, ensuring we are always 'achieving personal success' like our school motto depicts. Our values apply to both students and adults alike. Thanks to the staff for their professionalism in sharing their practice. Our teachers are amazing at what they do.

Progress with Room 17's rebuild is continuing behind the scenes. The design is done, and the tender period is over, the trees are felled to clear the site and the plans are in at Council for consent. Hopefully, it won't be long until the building commences.

Because of the trees being cut down, we have some firewood that we would like to make available for TAPS families personal use. Please contact the office and arrange a time to collect some.

Behind the scenes, teachers are busily preparing online reports for parents. These do differ from paper reports you would've seen in the past but posts will be more frequent (termly), reflective of what the student is learning at the time rather than 6 months later, and they will be accessible anywhere at any time through your smartphone or device. Please talk to your child about their learning. Each post on Hero will share the learning goal, the criteria the student had to include in order to be successful, a photograph or video of their actual day to day learning (not a contrived piece) and a comment from the teacher so it should be obvious to you as the parent/caregiver of what your child is learning. Please comment on the post - your child will be able to read your comments in years to come.

Recently the school has employed another ORS teacher after Mrs Lanah Gibbes changed roles in order to begin our 6th new entrant room. We'd like to welcome Miss Jonelle Seeney to the team. Speaking of new entrant numbers, based on our current knowledge from our pre-enrolments we are anticipating we will be beginning our 7th new entrant classroom in the middle of term 3, just in time for Mrs <u>Vicki Neustroski</u> to return from maternity leave. Lucky Team 1!

Our current roll is sitting just over 530 students. If you have a four-year-old child that will be coming to TAPS please make sure you let us know so we can plan accordingly.

Thank you to our families who completed the survey for Structured Literacy. Generally speaking, most families are positive about our use, some don't see the benefit for their older, capable learners and some don't have prior experience to compare to as their children have just started school. All feedback provided was worthwhile and has given us an insight into what we have and haven't done well and what we need to do next. Next week, Kylie McKay, Maree Parkes, Elizabeth Ellis and I will be visiting some Bay of Plenty schools that have been using a Structured Literacy approach for over a year. We are hoping to learn from their experience in the hope that we can quickly and more efficiently solve any puzzles of practice that arise for TAPS. I'll let you know how that goes.

A reminder for all visitors to our school - we are a smoke-free zone and a no vaping zone. This is nationwide and has been stipulated by the Ministry.

In discussion with Maree Parkes, we'd love to resurrect the mini Team 1 sharing shed that you may have seen by the hall door. Originally they were introduced pre-COVID but have since become a bit of a mess. Therefore we are going to move the shed by the front gate and we ask our community to please share any surplus garden produce you have from your home gardens. For example, mandarins, feijoas, lemons, seedlings etc. We will also keep a shelf for books in good condition.
