Welcome to Term 3, Week 3.

<u>Events</u>

We all enjoyed the uniform free day today. Our older children look so grown up out of uniform! The purpose was to raise money for the Te Awamutu Menz Shed after their premises were broken into and they had their tools stolen a week or so ago. We smashed our fundraising goal and I'm extremely proud to say we raised \$1022.30 for the cause. Thank you very much for your tremendous support. What an amazing community we live in.

On Tuesday our students enjoyed the Bernard Mangakahia Show from Nexus Arts, Australia. The tamariki thoroughly enjoyed watching the show and were wowed by his talents with hula hoops, drums and poi. It feels great to be able to host visitors again.

Team 4 Speech finals were held last Friday. Congratulations to our students for showing personal success in public speaking. It's not easy, but all of the presenters did a superb job! Ka may te wehi!

Yesterday our Kapa Haka group were invited to welcome Christopher Luxon to Te Awamutu at the Rose Gardens. Their performance was heart moving and powerful. <u>Staffing</u>

Claire Hocking has stepped into the Room 2 teacher role until the end of the year. You may recognise Claire as she has been one of our regular relieving teachers for the past year or two. We are so pleased that Claire is with us, and appreciate the patience of the Room 2 parents while we worked through this staffing challenge.

Also, our congratulations go out to Katie McNaughton. Not only did she get engaged over the holiday break, she has been awarded a permanent contract at TAPS to boot. We love having Katie as part of our whānau and we hope you get a chance to meet and interact with her at some point.

When Maree left for the Barrier she left leadership vacancies in Team 1 and 2. We'd love to announce Lanah Gibbes as the reliever Leader in Team 1, until the end of the year. Michelle Galbraith and Karen Sykes are working together to lead Team 2, also until the end of the year when we expect Elizabeth Ellis to return from maternity leave. Michelle has been withdrawn from her teaching responsibilities and is using the two days per week to lead Structured Literacy across our school. Room 12 are very lucky to continue with Mrs Jonelle Clayton and have Mrs Amy Harrop in a shared teaching role.

We are still looking for a cleaner to join the team and support the others to clean the school each afternoon. Due to staff absences, everyone has dug in to help out but Kim Fabish (Finance Administrator) has done more than her fair share of cleaning over the past week and a bit and it is hugely appreciated!

<u>Re-branding</u>

The school has engaged the services of a graphic design company to professionalise some of our print media and graphics around the school site. We have been given the opportunity to look at the first draft and we've shared this with staff. Parents are welcome to see the draft if visiting the office. Buying production tickets has given so many more parents the opportunity to visit our newly refurbished office area. We are glad you like it as much as we do!

The Team 1 steps to the playground have also had some new shade sails made and installed recently. You would be forgiven for not noticing as it was a pretty seamless transition.

We have had more trimming of trees and the removal of one at the back of the hall. This is for safety's sake as the one by the hall was rotten and the branches of others were dead and causing concern as a falling hazard. As we remove trees, we are purchasing more and replacing them for shade and aesthetics. A silver lining is; we are able to locate them in areas that better fit the future of our school layout.

New Room 17 is predominantly finished this week. This stand-alone, bespoke build is the last replacement of our four classrooms demolished in 2020. It has exceptional storage, hot water and all the mod-cons. Miss Nash and Room 6 tamariki are very excited to be moving in soon!

A huge thank you to Brendon Morehead Building and Maintenance for his work in adapting the last of the junior school fort, beside the new Room 17. Additionally to Matua Manu (caretaker), Jacqui Morrison (part-time caretaker's assistance) and Richard Sykes and Devon Packwood (husbands and all round good guys) for their amazing work in prepping the ground, framing it up with sleepers and creating the surrounding gardens (in progress). Soon the fort will be open for business once again.

Road Crossings

With the increase in our numbers (560+ students), there are more children coming and going each afternoon and a lot more cars on the road. **Please insist on your child using the patrol crossing!** We need to role model safe road crossings for all of our children yet I've witnessed many children running across the road further down, (or up) Teasdale Street with their parents or at their parents request. This is down right dangerous with the number of cars on the road between 8.30am and 9am or 3pm and 3.15pm. A short wait at the pedestrian crossing is a lot better than a long time in hospital in the horrendous event of an accident. PLEASE USE THE CROSSING.

COVID Update

Mask wearing is a hugely contested issue and whilst our Board has not changed any policies enforcing the wearing of face masks, we kindly ask parents and adults who come into **any school building** to wear a mask out of respect for our most vulnerable people health wise. <u>Board</u>

After three years or more of service for many of our current members, I wish to express my deep gratitude for their time on the TAPS Board of Trustees. I have been so lucky to work with a wonderful group of parents, who are fully invested in supporting the school to be the best environment possible to educate our children. Time on a Board can be very rewarding and often goes unnoticed behind the scenes but, at times, there are challenging moments or decisions to be made. I have found the current Board to be supportive, genuine, communicative, and focused on what is right. Thank you very much for your service!

Moving forward, our Returning Officer has received **ten** nominations for parent representatives for the next three year term. This amount of nominations is our best, for as long as we can remember. I highly appreciate the great response from our community in putting their names forward and I wish each of you the best of luck. The Returning Officer, who runs the elections on behalf of the school, will send out voting papers to our parent community to give you the chance to vote for those you feel are best placed to contribute to the future of our school. To all of our parents, please take the time to vote and return your papers. There will be a sealed box kept in the school office for you to place your votes in.

<u>Learning Data</u>

Over the past two months, we have been sharing our student's progress data with the Board. In the middle of the year, we analyse results class by class, noticing patterns, challenges and developing strategies for improvement. By the end of the year, each age group has a benchmark for where we would expect their learning to be. Therefore, mid-year we analyse **progress** made then at the end of the year we analyse **attainment/achievement** data. In July we shared the progress data with the Board. The following summarises that report;

- The Leadership Team developed a system for reporting differences between Structured Literacy and "normal" reading data.
- In Timatanga (Team 1), we can't measure individualised progress as easily as others. All students have started school at different times. Until they have been at school for 6 months, we only have one data point for the purpose of analysis.

• For Literacy, 20-25% of students in each class in Timatanga (Team 1) are in early foundation stages, learning letter names, shapes and sounds. The others are using decodable texts to learn to read. We note that the transition between using decodable texts and authentic texts (the 'normal readers' that parents may be used to) tends to occur during their time in Team 2.

• In Writing, most children are progressing. In many cases where progress has not been made, it can be attributed to the fact the child was already 'at' the expected level. Those who are not progressing and are achieving below expectations are monitored for potential intervention by our learning support staff (see below).

• In Numeracy, steady progress has been made across the school. The school has implemented a pilot in Team 4 to test the value of a maths knowledge programme. This has been hugely successful and the Board has agreed to fund learning support to run this school wide from Term 3 onwards.

• Across all areas, there are very few students who have regressed in their learning, compared to previous years. These children tend to present with learning difficulties, certain diagnosis or attendance has been problematic due to illness.

In August Michelle Galbraith and Heidi Osborn-Dunn presented intervention reports to the Board.

Michelle presented a report specifically related to Structured Literacy. The school is making significant changes to our practice to ensure improved learning outcomes for our students. The report, compiled by Michelle, comprehensively outlines the progress made across the school, analysing our strengths and includes next steps. A copy of her report is available to any parent who wishes to view it.

Heidi Osborn-Dunn, our Learning Support Coordinator, presented a report on interventions the school provides or co-ordinates with outside agencies. 114 students have received some form of intervention during Term 1 and 2. In that 114, students have only been counted once, even though they may have multiple forms of intervention. Interventions, referrals or agency examples include, but are not limited to, High Health Needs, In Class Support, Child Development Centre, Riding for the Disabled, English Speakers of Other Languages, social development groups etc.

Over the first half of the year 58 students have received extra support in Structured Literacy (outside of the classroom). Support has been provided for Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) for those excelling well beyond the expected levels of learning for their age group. TAPS has provided a "Boys Writing Group" to inspire our Year 5 and 6 boys to enjoy writing again.

As you would expect, support programmes have been impacted by COVID related absences for both staff and students.

TAPS provide a significant amount of learning support to our students. Some children attract funding from the Ministry of Education, but much of our in-school intervention is funded by our Board. I'd like to acknowledge the work that Heidi does to coordinate learning support for our students who need it most but also ensuring support is distributed as widely as finances and practicality allows. Recently, I have had feedback from an external source to say they wish all schools did as much as TAPS.

As always, there is so much to be proud of at our school. A great community, fabulous and caring students, a hardworking staff and an amazing team culture. Thank you for being a part of our whānau.
